HOME OF JOHN A. MEEKER.

Set back among the trees on Olive Place is the attractive home of John A. Meeker.

It is constructed of hollow tile blocks faced with Lammie brick, the rough texture in dark color blending with the red tile roof to produce a rich tapestry effect.

The house was erected by the Homes Company from designs by Grosvenor Atterbury, F. A. I. A., and contains ten rooms and two baths.

WINTER TIME-TABLE.

On Tuesday, October 16th, the Winter time-table will go into effect on the Long Island Railroad. Very few changes will be made in Forest Hills trains.

EXPENSES EXCEED RECEIPTS.

Chairman S. W. Eckman of the Finance Committee reports that two hundred dollars more is needed in collections from the community to meet the expenses of "Rainbow" Night and calls for contributions to meet the deficit.

SECOND LIBERTY LOAN.

Benjamin Strong, Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank for New York, has appointed the following committee to obtain subscriptions in Forest Hills: G. C. Meyer, Chairman; J. M. Demarest, E. A. Dow, G. B. Everitt, F. J. Risk, L. B. Stowe and A. C. Wessman. Additional appointments it is expected will presently be made.

For Forest Hills to do its part, it will be necessary for each household to buy at least one bond. A community that has been a unit in displaying patriotism on the Fourth of July and looking out for the comforts of the soldiers who are fighting its battles in the field, is now called upon, as a unit, to supply financial backing for the war.

It will avail nothing to supply the men with smokes and dinners here at home if they do not have the equipment with which to deliver the bullets in France. The campaign is on—*buy at least one bond*, in instalments if necessary, but see one of the Committee and *buy it now*. Subscriptions will close October 27th.

TENNIS.

Kew Gardens was defeated by the local team, eight matches to none, on the Kew Club courts, Sunday, September 30th. Messrs. Cravis, Davenport, Mecabe and Worth, in singles; and Messrs. Becker and Robinson, Powell and Kerr, Mecabe and Worth, and Cravis and Davenport played for Forest Hills.

In the Class A. Doubles tournament just completed on the West Side courts, Worth and Mecabe reached the semi-finals, where they were defeated by Myrick and Campbell.

The fall tennis tournament of the Real Estate Board of New York is now being played on the West Side courts, the events including singles and doubles for Classes A and B.

IN RETROSPECT.

To the twelve hundred men of the Rainbow Division who came to us last Saturday night,—hail and farewell! They have already done for Forest Hills more than Forest Hills can ever do for them,—but Forest Hills will keep on trying as the days and months and years go by.

To Philip Allen Swartz the community is indebted for the idea, and leadership in the execution of the plan that brought the men here. It was a two-fold idea, to which it remained for the Evening Sun, in its editorial of October 1st, to give this eloquent expression:

"No doubt it meant something to American soldier boys to be thus welcomed in homes of the people they are going to fight for. They will remember this little glimpse into the cheerful corners of the peaceful world they are leaving behind.

"But perhaps it is even more fortunate that the families that are doing the entertaining should have the war literally come home to them so. Not every household is sending away a soldier of its own. Those who have given even one meal to soldiers will doubtless be able thereafter to take a more sympathetic and helpful part in the war duties of those who stay in America."

"RAINBOW" NIGHT.

Saturday, September 29th shortly after 5 o'clock in the afternoon, the soldier guests of Forest Hills, eagerly planned for through the preceding week, arrived on their special trains from Camp Mills. In less than half an hour twelve hundred men in khaki had been welcomed in three hundred homes, each by an hostess who had extended an invitation to him through the Camp Y. M. C. A. and looked forward especially to his coming.

Dinners were first on the program,—turkey dinners in most instances,—which the men enjoyed with a healthy capacity, as they did smokes and candies and everything that was supplied, while they talked and danced and sang their way into membership in the families entertaining them until time for the general gathering for the entertainment in Station Square.

THE ENTERTAINMENT.

Rainbow Division Entertainment in Station Square began with a Band Concert soon after dinner and continued until traintime. We are indebted to Col. Hough of the 166th Ohio Infantry for the presence of the Band of that Regiment, ably conducted by Mr. W. A. Sands.

After appropriate, brief remarks by Rev. Philip A. Swartz, Chairman of the Special Rainbow Night Committee and by President Lyman Beecher Stowe of the Community Council, Miss Helen Keller, was introduced. Miss Keller, who has but recently taken up her residence in Forest Hills, was accompanied by her friend and teacher Mrs. Macy. Miss Keller spoke briefly of the value of "Our Flag" and was given a warm welcome. Then for an hour or more the lights on the Great White Way must have grown dim as Ed Wynn the popular comedian from the Winter Garden appeared introducing with humorous comment one Broadway favorite after another. The crowd was especially pleased with the stories of James J. Corbett and the patriotic oratory of Frank Keenan.

The last half hour was devoted to singing familiar songs, under leadership of Mr. Brock of the 166th infantry. As the audience finished singing "The Star Spangled Banner" many red ship's lights were started at intervals along the Station wall while from the top of the Inn tower Private John Turner of the 166th Ohio sounded "Taps."
