# FIRST ANNUAL MEETING

# Members of the Gardens Corporation Will Hear Report as to What Has Been Done

Louis Dean Speir, secretary of the Gardens Corporation, is ready to make a thorough report to the first annual meeting of the organization, to be held next Monday evening in the Church-in-the-Gardens.

The mass meeting of citizens, held on Dec. 7, approved the recommendations of the organization committee. These rec-These recemmendations called for:

(a) The incorporation of Gardens Corporation as a membership corporation.

(b) The formal adoption by it, when formed, of the bylaws approved at the mass meeting.

(c) The acceptance by Gardens Corporation, when formed, of all qualified property owners who should apply as members.

(d) The acceptance by Gardens Corporation of the assignment from the Sage Foundation Homes Company and the Russell Sage Foundation of their rights under the restrictions, and the assumption of their obligations.

The certificate of incorporation having been signed and filed with the state and local authorities, the Gardens Corporation came into being on Dec. 12.

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On Dec. 13 the directors organized and elected these officers: Lawrence F. Abbott, president; John R. Davies and Catharine S. J. Wilson, vice-presidents; George B. Hanavan, treasurer, and Louis D. Speir, secretary. The directors have held six meetings, and numerous committee meetings have been held. A card index of property owners has been made, and bills for maintenance and dues were mailed to all on Jan. 1. To date (Jan. 16) \$3,045.89 for maintenance and \$2.874.78 dues have been received from 251 people. Of the 251 who have paid, all but 13 have paid both maintenance and dues. Of the 13 who did not pay dues, six asked for an explanation.

the 13 who did not pay dues, six asked for an explanation, and only seven have definitely not paid the dues.

According to Mrs. Donald G. Clark, chairman of membership, applications for membership have been received from

326 property owners.

If every property owner pays maintenance and dues, the income will be \$22,800 a year. This is just what the physical up-keep of the Gardens has cost the Sage Foundation Homes Company. Under the old plan, the deficit of about \$12,000 every year was met by the Homes Company. The new corporation will spend on the up-keep only what it receives.

The Gardens Corporation has taken over from the Sage

Foundation Homes Company:

(a) Outdoor Physical Maintenance, including:

Maintenance of existing sewers and pumping of sewage at two pumping stations; Snow ploughing and removal of snows;

Snow ploughing and removal of snows;
Cleaning and repair of streets;
Cutting grass on parks and parkways along all streets and caring for trees, bushes and shrubs;
Maintaining lamp posts and street signs.

(b) Architectural Supervision, including:
Employing supervising architects and passing on all plans, and seeing that the building restrictions and the architectural harmony of the place are maintained.

(c) Office Work, including: Maintaining an office with sufficient clerical workers, keeping up records, sending out bills, collecting money, keeping accounts, paying expenses, sending notices, attending to correspondence, etc.

Office work has been arranged for thus: Mrs. H. P. Green, who for several years has been secretary of the Community Council, has been engaged as executive secretary to supervise council, has been engaged as executive secretary to supervise all office work, giving such time as she can spare from her other work. The corporation has been supplied with desk room in the office of Messrs. Colton & Ayres, and has arranged to share equally with them the services of a stenographer, who, with Mrs. Green's supervision and help, it is believed, will be able to do most of the office work.

#### BIRDS HOLD A MASS MEETING

Editor, Forest Hills Bulletin:

The birds of Forest Hills Gardens held a Community Council meeting recently, and as president of the Audubon Society, requested me to be present.

The complaints of the council were many and long, but were particularly directed towards the lack of proper maintenance, housing shortage, and a failure of the people of the Gardens to comply with the promises and represen-tations held out to them when the birds agreed to make the Gardens their home.

The wrens, robins and song sparrows were especially incensed at the lack of repairs made by the landlords to existing houses and feeding stations.

A crested fly-catcher handed in the following resolution:

"Be It Resolved, That the song birds of Forest Hills Gardens appeal to the people of the community to provide them with water and food regusystematically during the winter, and provide bird houses for our occupancy this spring.

"Be It Further Resolved, That it is our sentiment and opinion that if our presence and songs are no longer desired or appreciated, that stern necessity will compel us to take up our habitation in some other community."

The resolution was passed unanimously, and a call sent out for a mass meeting to be held at a later date.

"Yes, indeed," answered the mother; "every word of it It has only been told in such a way so that it would carry its message to your heart and mind, and stimulate a good thought into action.
