

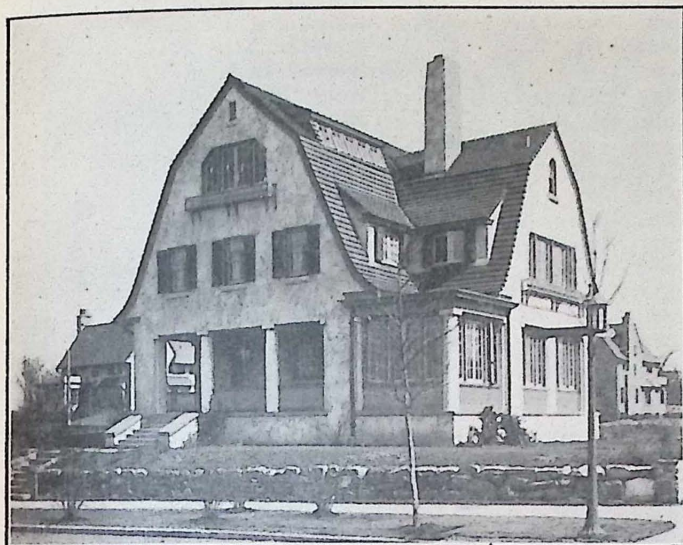

HOME OF PROFESSOR LEE GALLOWAY.

In this number of the Bulletin is shown the home of Professor Lee Galloway, located on the northeast corner of Greenway South and Rockrose Place. This house, adopted from the old "Dutch Colonial," with its gambrel roof, is quaint and homelike and is admirably adjusted to its use. On the long side is an enclosed porch, with sleeping porch above. Attached to the house by a tile-covered hood is the Garage. The plan of this house effects great economy of space. The entrance is into a rectangular hall, with a large opening to the living room, the main stairs go up to a landing and connect with the service stairs at this point. Back of the living room is the dining room separated by wide sliding doors, opening up the house in a very agreeable fashion. The living room is about 18 to 20 feet with a large fireplace, faced with Rookwood tile of a warm pleasing color, with French windows opening onto the porch on each side of the fireplace. The butler's pantry is of good size, furnished with ample dressers and sink. The kitchen arrangement was well studied. Access to this is through the servants porch where a table and benches of quaint design are built in.

On the second floor are the four bed rooms, sleeping porch and two bath rooms. Large closets are provided for all the rooms.

On the third floor are two bed rooms and bath, and a large, well-lighted studio with a dark room for developing photographs.

The construction is of hollow tile blocks faced with a warm gray texture stucco, the roof being tile of a light brown color.

The house was constructed by the Homes Company from plans prepared by its own Architectural Department.

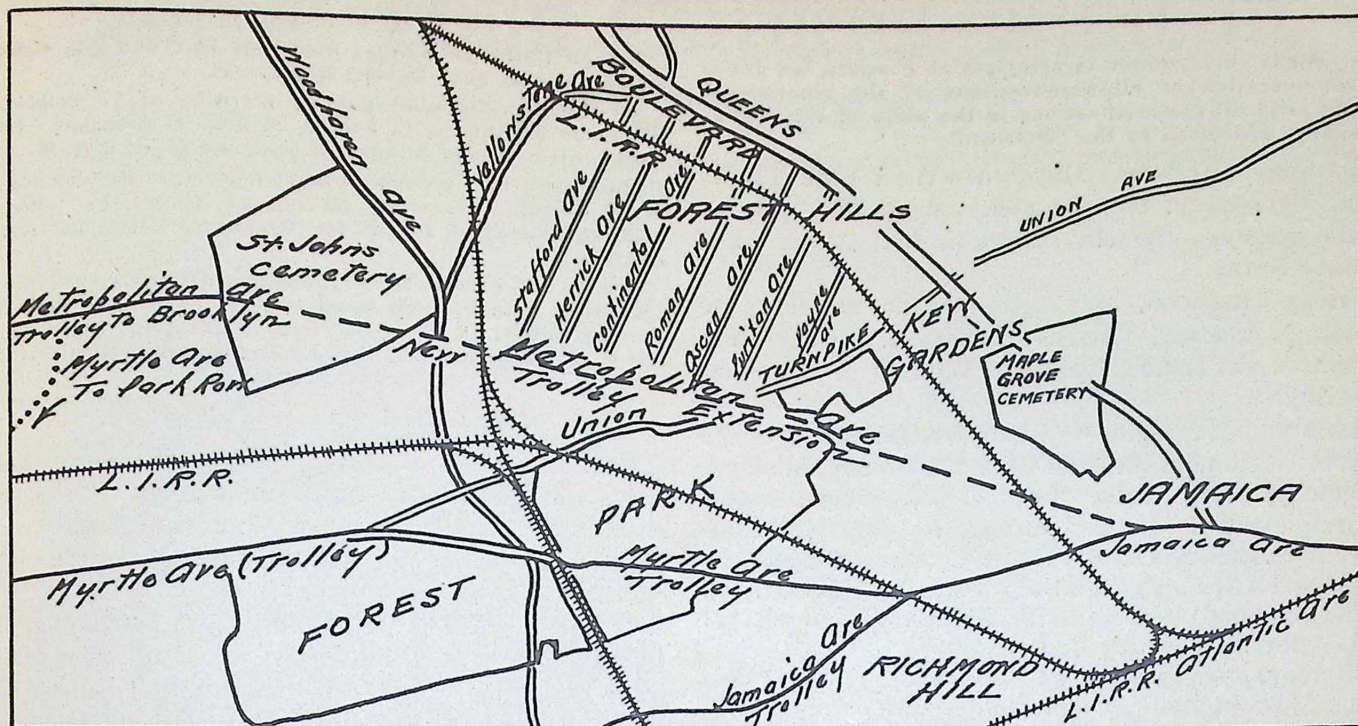

METROPOLITAN AVENUE TROLLEY LINE.

The Mayor's action in signing the franchise for the extension of the Metropolitan Avenue trolley line to Jamaica is of great importance to the people of Forest Hills, who will now have a direct line to Brooklyn. At present the route is roundabout—by way of Ja-

maica or Manhattan. The trolley line will connect at Jamaica with the trolley on Jamaica Avenue, it will also provide a connection on Metropolitan Avenue with the Myrtle Avenue elevated line to Park Row, Manhattan.
